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68th Annual Report

*presented at the Annual Meeting held in the Gospel Union Hall, 145 Commonwealth Street,
Sydney, on Tuesday, 26th September, 1950*

IN a large population such as we have in Sydney there will always be at the bottom of our community life the moral wrecks, whom it is the desire of all Christians and Social Service workers alike to rescue, if they cannot prevent them from disaster. Sometimes the catastrophe comes through sheer misfortune—the loss of health, the death of friends, or some other of the numerous forms in which calamity arrives with grim hand and unexpected foot. Of whatever kind the cause may be, all around us lie the victims of disaster, and it is a duty incumbent upon us to minister to these dire cases of need.

How touching indeed when we come face to face with the problem of a young woman of promise—homeless, friendless, disgraced! We cannot but recall the very tender attitude of our Master towards such and endeavour to meet the problem with something of His spirit of understanding and sympathy. And what is even more sad is to see children unfortunately handicapped, and suffering innocently! Christ did not wish that they

should be neglected. He took them up in His arms and blessed them. There is not one little pinched, ragged child of a drunken mother, of whom His words would not be true, "Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones, for I say unto you that in heaven their angels do always behold the face of My Father which is in heaven." It is both wise and patriotic, as well as a benevolent and Christian act, to rescue cases like the foregoing from their surroundings, and to endeavour to ensure their self-respect, and to make, if possible, their future prosperous and productive. There is room for all methods that Christian workers can apply.

So far as our own service is concerned, the ever-increasing difficulty of the work of rescue has been felt, but withal much joyful service has been accomplished, and it is a privilege to place on record a few facts concerning our service which may help to give our subscribers and sympathisers some faint idea of the import-

ance of the work, as well as a recognition of its absolute necessity.

The same line of approach which through the years has been adopted has been maintained, but with ever renewed vigour we have pressed forward in our task, presenting the gospel of the Grace of God as the only effective lever to raise the fallen and safeguard the endangered. How often we have discovered that hidden beneath a degraded and sometimes loathsome exterior there is a woman's heart capable of the deepest affection, and of responding under wise and patient guidance to the claims of Jesus Christ!

The Board rejoices that it has been favoured by having workers in the various branches whose sterling qualities and earnest zeal in the rescue and care of young women and children have been manifest.

"BETHESDA HOME"

This Home at Newtown, with a warm Christian welcome, opens its doors to girls facing the darkness of disgrace and despair. The story that belongs to these cases need not be recounted here; always pitiful, sometimes very sad. Some of them are difficult when they come to us, but there is almost invariably a yielding at last to expressions of genuine gratitude and appreciation. Others are agreeable from the day they come to us and respond to all the love and guidance bestowed upon them. Regular services are held and every means is used

to exercise a Christian influence upon these girls so soon to experience the pangs of motherhood; yes, facing also the decision whether to keep or to abandon their babes to another's care, and making determination that, if possible, their experience shall be abandoned to the limbo of forgotten events. How much the services and the tender advice given means to some of these girls eternity will only reveal, but we have had ample assurance from a number that a worthwhile ministry has been exercised.

During the past year fifty-seven girls have been accommodated for periods from three to seven months according to the need of the case. One particularly interesting case we handled was that of a girl who, under our influence, accepted Christ as her Saviour, prior to the birth of her baby. Subsequently she was married to the father of her child by the Superintendent of the Society in the "Bethesda Home." The occasion provided a wonderful opportunity to impress upon all the inmates the sanctity of marriage. This husband had been so impressed with the loving and sympathetic care that his bride had received while in the Home that he began to recognise in a new way the value of Christianity, and he has also made confession of his need of God's saving grace.

Another was the case of a girl married to a Chinese man who was extradited to his home country shortly afterwards. This girl, unwanted by her parents, homeless and without friends, was taken in at the "Bethesda Home." Some months later, having given birth to her

baby, she was engaged in Victoria as a mental nurse. In a letter dated 6th June, she wrote: "I miss all my good friends at Gilpin Street very much. I feel it was God's guidance brought me there so that I could find Christ as my Saviour. I do hope I will always be a good Christian. I am going to see about getting baptised. I'd love to be a missionary, and bring more people to know Christ, but He has other plans for me. I know He will never fail me."

The Home has been taxed most weeks to capacity, and Matron Olive Smith has been glad of the companionship of Miss Jean Brown as her assistant in the spiritual care of the work. Matron Smith, having had experience in an executive capacity and also as a Deaconess, is particularly fitted for her task and is giving excellent service.

Special tribute must be paid to Miss A. Simmonds, who attends each week to play the organ for the services in the Home. Her playing and her bright personality are always an inspiration!

"NIGHT REFUGE"

This institution, though somewhat handicapped in its usefulness this year due to extensive alterations to the building, was designed and has existed to provide shelter for unfortunate and friendless women. It is the centre to which the Police direct cases, and to which many heavy laden in heart seem to wend their weary way.

Efforts are always made in cases where women have become addicted to drink or immorality to induce them to abandon their evil courses and to accept decent employment away from their former associates.

The Shelter, situated in Beauchamp Lane, Surry Hills, has through the years proved of untold advantage to many. There are, of course, those who have resisted every means of reclamation and have been a trial to all who have endeavoured to help them forsake the vices that had been their downfall.



We discover again and again in this branch of the work that there is a tremendous difference between one who goes intentionally out of the way and continues there by depravity of will, and one who is a helpless wanderer straying by delusion yet genuinely desirous of retracing the step.

"BABIES' HOME"

An average of thirty to thirty-two children have been cared for from week to week. Most of these come from broken homes, or are cases deserted by one or both parents. Matron R. Murphy and her Assistant, Miss M. Niblett, have carried the burden of responsibility. They are both competent and, though frequently without adequate staff, have maintained at a splendid efficiency the work of the Home, and the care of the children. The following is a paragraph or two from a letter received by the Superintendent a month ago from one of the local residents at Rockdale, where the "Babies' Home" is situated:

"I was particularly impressed with the way the children have been trained, and I think the Home a credit to the Matron and Sister, who are lovely Christians. The children look the picture of health, and I can see they are well cared for and well fed. God continue to bless you and your Society for caring for the less fortunate people of our land."

CARE OF LOST CHILDREN

Again and again during the course of the year we have been called upon by the Police Department to give shelter to children found wandering in the streets—homeless, lost, or deserted. They have frequently come to us grimy and dirty, have had to be bathed, given their meals, and put to bed. One ten-year girl came all the way from Nambucca Heads. She had stowed away in a tourist coach, had crawled behind the back seat, and was not detected until the bus reached Sydney. Another, a lad, had hiked from Lithgow; a third had come from near Wollongong. Some were very young children of two or three years. One was a little mite picked up in a theatre entrance where he had apparently been abandoned. All were taken care of till eventually claimed or taken by the Welfare Department to more permanent abode. We look upon this service as a real ministry to the community, and gladly do it for the sake of Him Who taught us to respect and care for little children.

OUT-OF-WORK MEN'S TEA

A regular feature through the years, affording pleasure and profit alike, is the Thursday evening free Tea and the Gospel Service, at which a motley crowd of men of all ages gather. The majority are old-age pensioners, but there is always a sprinkling of younger men who, for one reason or another, seem to be unemployed. One suspects that drink has been the handicap in most cases,

and frequently the missionary hears the sad confession of men who have taken the downward road through this evil. But how these men love to sing their old favourite hymns! For some of them Thursday evening is the one bright spot in their week. The Gospel message is simply and aptly applied, or a bright personal testimony given, if haply the seed may fall into ground prepared.

MISSION AND RELIEF WORK

An innovation in connection with the Mission work of our Society has been the appointment of a Male Missionary at our Headquarters in Commonwealth Street in the person of Mr. W. T. Sonners. Mr. Sonners is a Tasmanian, and came to us after completing a course in the Sydney Bible Training Institute. He has distinct musical ability, as well as special discernment and talent for dealing with individuals. Friends of the Society will be gratified to know that under his supervision the work has taken new heart. It is a frequent occurrence to see men under the influence of drink attending the evening service in the Hall, following the Open Air testimony and the music provided by Mr. Sonners and his band of helpers at the street corner. In the work of the Sunday School the Missionary has the able assistance of Mr. R. Stone and a group of splendid honorary workers, as well as the support of the Mission Sisters. An open-air Sunday School in association with the work is in the capable hands of Miss Sally Wales.

Miss Edith Alford, who has served as a Mission Sister for many years, has been encouraged by the appointment of Miss Maurine Cahill to assist in the duties of the district. The Sisters have taken a special interest in the visitation of the district and of the South Sydney Women's Hospital, and in maintaining the regular meetings for women and girls at the Commonwealth Street Hall. The latter meetings have been one of the brightest features of their service, and a splendid group of girls attends weekly. A Christian Endeavour Society and a Band of Hope also function under the guidance of the Sisters.

Permission has been given for a Russian Service to be held in the Hall each Sunday morning. Some 25 to 40 have been attending these meetings regularly. All are new Australians contacted by a Russian engineer in the N.S.W. Railway Department, Mr. A. J. Obohoff, A.M.I.E.

Most serviceable cupboards have been erected at the rear of the Mission Hall for the storage of clothing received for distribution. In this connection a donation of masonite was received from the firm of James Budge Pty. Ltd.

Due to the Miners' Strike relief had to be extended at a particular period to a number of families. The Society shared with other Charitable organisations in the dispersal of money and groceries resulting from the Lord Mayor's Appeal.

Cases of distress have been relieved by the workers in the ordinary course of their visitation. Parcels of groceries and clothing have been distributed to homes, and to individuals calling at the Headquarters from week to week. Frequently cakes or fruit donated by firms or individuals have been taken to homes where such extras are not usually part of the regular daily menu.

The Mission staff, accompanied by honorary workers, have each Sunday morning visited Central and Darlinghurst Police Stations carrying their gifts of hot tea and refreshments to those locked up in the cells. The provisions were given to no less than 3,369 contacts. As most of those incarcerated are the victims of intemperance, special effort is made to direct their attention to the evils wrought by strong drink, and to induce them to abandon its use. An invitation is always given, and frequently availed of, that the Mission Headquarters be contacted upon release from gaol. One week, more than a dozen men contacted visited the Headquarters and were assisted in various ways.

In this connection we would like to appeal for good left-off men's clothing, as some people seem to have the idea that we only cater for women and children in need.

LIDCOMBE OLD MEN'S HOME

Our Missionary, Mr. E. J. Rowe, who has laboured consistently for 13 years at Lansdowne Gospel Hall and gathered about him a goodly company of adults and

children, takes a special pleasure in visiting each Monday the Lidcombe Old Men's Home, where a service attended by some 25 men is held.

Mr. Rowe tells in glowing terms of the appreciation of some of the inmates, and the help that has been received from the meetings. A small Christmas gift is always provided for the men who regularly attend.

HOSPITAL

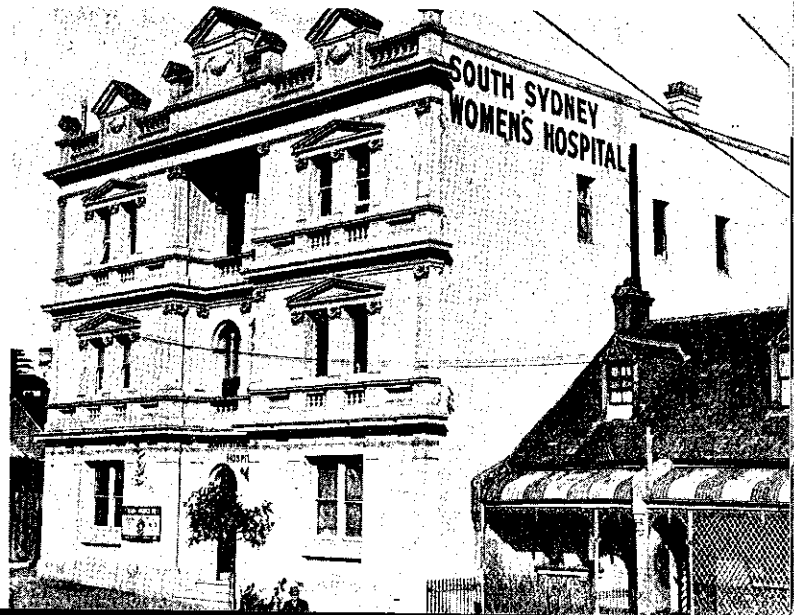
The top floor of our South Sydney Women's Hospital was re-opened shortly after the year commenced, and there has been such an influx of patients that difficulty was experienced, as the year advanced, in handling those who came to us for attention. Our Hospital, which normally takes a daily average of about forty, was actually handling an average of 56.

The main difficulties faced were insufficient accommodation for the handling of labour cases, inadequate laundry facilities, lack of a Premature Babies' Ward, and the serious problem of having no lift for passengers or food. Following upon a visit by an Officer of the Hospitals' Commission, it is hoped that better facilities will be available for coping with our work in the near future.

A letter from the Commission requesting that we endeavour to assist in overcoming the acute shortage of beds for admission of maternity cases, by shortening the aver-

age stay per mother, was sympathetically received. The Medical Staff is co-operating as far as possible in this matter. Patients are now being discharged earlier, and we are giving post-hospital nursing care in the home.

Matron Fawcett and Sister Graves have given unstinting service and consecrated loyalty to their task and the Board, recognising the onerous responsibility assumed by these members of the staff and the handicap under which they worked due to inadequate facilities, records

its appreciation. Despite their duties, Matron and Sister have found time on Sundays to conduct an Open-Air Sunday School for children living round about the Hos-

pital, and at Christmas-time to provide, with the cooperation of the nursing staff, a special feature in the way of Christmas tree and carols for the patients, as well as for the children of the Sunday School.

Quite a number of Missionary candidates have received training in obstetrics at the Hospital during the course of the year, and there has always existed between Matron and staff the happiest relationship. Patients often remark upon the Christian atmosphere of the Hospital.

Our Hospital had the distinction some five years ago of training the first native Australian to become a qualified obstetric nurse. Another girl, Lily Kunoth, of Croker Island, is at present doing her course at our Hospital and upon completion will give service among her own people.

Total admissions to the Hospital for the year were 1,625 and 1,089 births were recorded. Cases for operative treatment amounted to 371. The number of beds provided was 17,674 for women, and 10,027 for children. There were 6,143 attendances at the Outpatients' Department.

STAFF

The year has been marked by a number of staff movements.

The appointment of Mr. W. T. Sonners has already been referred to.

Mrs. Buckingham retired early in the year from the

oversight of the Open All Night Refuge owing to ill-health. We sympathised with her in her suffering, and regretted losing her valuable services, but are happy to report that she has so far improved in health that she has recently been able to resume work with the Society in another capacity.

The resignation of Matron Ogilvie from the position of Matron of "Bethesda Home" was received with regret and the thanks of the Board was conveyed to her for faithful and valued service to the Society for a period of 6½ years. Matron Ogilvie has since taken a position as Matron of the "Bethel Rest Home" for Aged People, which is under the control of the Ashfield Baptist Church. We wish for her every blessing in her new sphere of activity.

Due to the increased cost of living, adjustments were made in the salaries of a number of the staff.

Dr. Dart had "leave of absence" to undergo a major operation in October, but was able after six weeks to undertake the duties of his office with its many cares and responsibilities.

Miss M. Ramsay and Miss O. Smith were temporarily employed as Mission Sisters. The former served only a brief period, but Miss Smith, after leaving to fulfil a contract with the United Aborigines' Mission, returned to the service of the Society, and is now the new

Matron of "Bethesda Home." Miss J. Brown was appointed later in the year as her assistant.

Miss G. Ricketts retired from her full-time position in charge of the Christian Workers' Depot, but has been able to keep an interest in the Depot by coming in once a week.

A very happy function was held in June, when the privilege of contact between the members of the staff and of the Board was availed of. It is anticipated that such informal gatherings may be possible again in the New Year.



PROPERTY

Considerable alteration has been effected at the Headquarters, making provision for a very necessary enlargement of the kitchen and toilet facilities.

A general survey of the position with regard to a replanning of the Headquarters' property was also undertaken. It was hoped that sometime in the future we might be able to erect a new building which would not only accommodate our work, but also incorporate certain space for sub-letting, thus providing a permanent income for the Society. However, the present cost of building is so exorbitant that the matter is being further canvassed. The Board desires to place on record its gratitude to Mr. C. O. Harrison for sketch plans he prepared and for advice tendered. The services of an Architect have now been secured for the fuller consideration of the matter.

Quite a programme of improvements to the Open All Night Refuge was undertaken during the course of the year. A completely new electric lighting service was installed, also a new gas and hot-water service. The bathroom and lavatory accommodation was greatly improved, and the building renovated inside on the three floors by painting and the addition of new furniture. In this connection a splendid gift of furniture was received from the firm of Claude R. Ogden & Co. Pty. Ltd. The Refuge has not been able to accommodate as many cases during the year owing to the carrying out of these necessary improvements.

The Sydney Bible Night School during recent months rented the use of a room in our Headquarters' building for their accommodation, and two small rooms under the Main Office were leased to the Child Evangelism Fellowship. An arrangement was also entered into with a view to accommodating the Christian Radio Missionary Fellowship in the rear portion of the basement of our Headquarters, and sub-division of this area has been effected in readiness for their occupancy early in the new financial year.

Due to the rapid housing development and the opening up of denominational causes in close proximity, our Hall at Villawood was sold to the Baptist Union of N.S.W. It is gratifying to know that this building, which has been used for Christian service since its erection, will continue to function as a centre of Christian worship and fellowship for folk in the district. An allotment the Society owned at Punchbowl, which was lying idle, was also disposed of during the year.

At the "Babies' Home" fire fighting equipment was installed to comply with the provisions of the Child Welfare Department, and the Rockdale Rotary Club provided a new double stainless steel sink and draining-board in the kitchen.

Storm and Tempest Clause Insurance covers were taken out on all of our properties, and Cash in Transit and Public Risk Policies were also effected.

The question of providing better laundry facilities at

the South Sydney Women's Hospital was taken up with the Hospitals' Commission. Considerable time was spent by the President and Superintendent in acquiring information and viewing suitable equipment, but the matter is still in course of negotiation. All of the wards and much of the furniture were repainted at the Hospital towards the close of the year.

MEDICAL STAFF

Once again we express our indebtedness to our medical staff for their assiduous attention to duty at the Hospital, and at the "Babies' Home."

Dr. Harvey Carey was given "leave of absence" for twelve months to undertake a Post-graduate Course in England.

Drs. George Cummins and R. Chandler were also granted "leave of absence," and Drs. F. C. Hughes, A. L. Hellestrand, S. Hughes and R. H. F. Swain were appointed as Junior Officers to fill the vacancies that occurred.

Other special appointments were as follows:—Dr. J. Knox, M.R.C.O.G., F.R.C.S., to the position of Honorary Consulting Obstetrician and Gynaecologist, and Drs. David Brown and C. Everingham as Honorary Medical Officers at the "Babies' Home."

MEMBERSHIP ROLL

An appeal that went out from Headquarters resulted

in an influx of members to the Society, some seventy-three folk availing themselves of the opportunity to enrol.

These friends have not only promised regular financial assistance, but are taking a prayerful interest in our work. Any who read this report and would like to have such a part with us are asked to communicate with the Superintendent.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

We commenced the year with a reduced number on our Board of Management, Messrs. F. H. Farrar, W. C. A. Starling and G. E. Ardill having retired. Mr. J. W. Budge was unanimously elected to the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of the President, and he has filled his position with grace and dignity. The meetings of the Board have been characterised by a

delightful spirit of fellowship, and a genuine desire to serve the highest interests of the community.

FINANCIAL

The Income and Expenditure Account of the Sydney Rescue Work Society bears a striking resemblance to that of last year. Although there has been a slight decrease in donations, this has been offset by an increase in Child Endowment and Sustenance Contributions, and the year has ended with a credit balance.

Property repair was a heavy item of expenditure.

On the South Sydney Women's Hospital it will be noted that the increase in patients handled has reflected itself in a general increase in expenditure for salaries, provisions, and domestic charges. Income resulted in a slight increase in Patients' Fees, and a considerable increase in Government subsidy. The year closed with a loss of about £700, which was £1,000 better than last year.

Viewing the work as a whole there has been a gradual development of the financial position and the financial responsibility over the past seven years. The total amount handled this year, £18,826/9/3, was four times as large as that handled in 1943, when the Superintendent assumed his responsibilities. The growth of staff and the ruling Award rates of pay accounted for an expenditure of more than half of this total.

It is of interest to report that a new Account was opened in February entitled Sydney Rescue Work Society

No. 2 Account for the receiving of moneys from the sale of properties. The accruing amounts will be specifically utilised for the purchase or improvement of properties, as the Board might from time to time determine.

OUR CONTRIBUTORS

The list of donations and subscriptions attached to this report will show that a great deal of practical sympathy has been manifested by friends and supporters of the work. One unsolicited contribution of £1,000, towards the end of our financial year, enabled us to end the year with a credit balance. For this we render thanks to God and to His servants who were motivated by Him to make this generous gift.

The cost of the maintenance of the several Homes has considerably increased in recent years, particularly since the war, but we are glad to report that to some extent this has been minimised through liberal assistance afforded by firms who have given donations of meat, bread, groceries and produce. Some of them have been particularly generous at Christmastime; two firms, Gartrell White Ltd. and Sargents' Ltd., have made regular weekly donations of bread and cakes.

Other kind friends have made or purchased toys, forwarded gifts of clothing, or provided entertainment for the benefit and delight of children and adults cared for in our various institutions. To all these generous donors the Board tenders heartfelt thanks.

Two donors, Mrs. Harding and Mrs. Courtney, of Naremburn, who have spent one day per week all through the year making toys, deserve our special thanks. Nor do we overlook the Ladies' Working Circle, who meet regularly at the "Babies' Home" to sew and to provide articles essential for the clothing and warmth of the children; their service is a worthy and sacrificial one indeed! Mrs. B. Griffiths has also rendered much practical help in initiating and providing the money for improvements helpful to the work of the "Babies' Home," and to her we express gratitude for such sustained interest and support.
