

Impressed by the need of destitute and orphan children, as an expression of thankfulness and as a service to the community, through the Council of the Children's Homes, the Presbyterian Church of Australia in the State of Western Australia established "Burnbrae," Hills Road, Byford, which was officially opened by Her Excellency Lady Mitchell in

December, 1938, consequent upon an initial gift of £1000 from the Late Sir James Burns of "Cowan Brae," Parramatta, N.S.W. For the older boys at "Burnbrae" it became evident that their future development could be the better cared for by the establishment of another supplementary home, where the principles of intensive farming, market gardening, horticulture, dairying, poultry and animal husbrandry, viticulture, trades and higher education could be readily taught. "Benmore," Middle Swan Road, Caversham, within two and a half miles of Midland and Guildford, consisting of fifty acres of good land right in the heart of one of the best natural grape districts in Australia, and capable, in a small way, of being utilised

for all the purposes intended, was purchased and in a few months considerable transformation has taken place both within the substantially built large residence and on the outside grounds.





*Items have been purchased as matter of urgent necessity by arrangement with the bank against the overdraft, and money to be credited against their purchase would be welcomed indeed.

It is firmly believed that groups and clubs and organisations existing within the churches could undertake to satisfy the needs outlined above especially under section "13," and "as the heart grows rich in giving" the congregations will be enriched rather than impoverished. The young people of St. Giles P.F.A. have undertaken to prepare, provide and maintain a 300 bed rose garden, which will give them pleasure, the boys instruction, and beautification plus financial gain to "Benmore." Already they have given many hours enjoyable service to the home.

The plan herewith, prepared by our architects, Messrs. Powell, Cameron and Chisholm, presents an idea for the proposed additions, which will cost approximately £6000, and when completed provide for one hundred boys, and the machinery has been set in motion to obtain these from overseas, and it is desired to have a completed home ready for them.

Donations are recognised as allowable deductions from Income Tax.

It is proposed to prepare Annual Reports and Pictorial Calendars, which will publicise gifts received and appeal to the sympathy of others.
